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Words are Important

I think it is funny sometimes when I preach a sermon in the first service and think, oh wow, that was a really great statement I made at the end of the sermon. Then I am in the middle of the sermon during the second service and I go, "oh I should have written that down, what was it that I said that sounded so profound?" I really do need to write it down to help me recall what I thought was so meaningful. But then as the sermon takes on a life of its own in the second service I discover something else that comes out just as evocative. Yes, the written word is important to remember, but equally important is to be open to the diversity of ideas.

Long ago, I encountered a book that I despised with a passion. The book was called, "The Giver" and I found it triggering when it talked about an infant being killed as a form of population control. I had a nephew who died as an infant and to this day his death troubles me, knowing there was nothing anyone could do to protect this precious child. But what surprised me is that this book I could not finish was given the Newberry Award, an award given for the most distinguished contributions in American Literature for children. I could not wrap my head around the idea that this book that I could not even finish could get such a distinguished award, let alone sell 12 million copies. However, if I would have read on I might have discovered the book focused on a young boy who was given the job of holding all the memories. You see, the story was really about a society that prided itself on conformity, and everyone was given a task from birth that lasted throughout their lifespan. Their memories were taken away so they would not know the evils of the world, the pain, the suffering, or even the hunger that people had experienced. But, lost also was the memory of color, and rainbows lost their beauty. What would have become obvious if I had read the book instead of the "Cliff Notes" I would have discovered that this young boy discovered all the atrocities that were being committed because people did not remember. So, he began giving back their memories to bring peace into their lives, to build human connection, and to stop them from doing the very things that they had forgotten were wrong.

I may not have liked this book, but I can't deny that it had a wonderful message that is so important today. I fear that we are in need of remembering where we come from, and we need to remember whom we belong to, and we need to remember whom we are called to be. Hopefully, you remember the quote by George Santayana, "Those who forget history are condemned to repeat it." I had an amazing opportunity a couple of years ago to sit and visit with an amazing woman with a beautiful soul, who talked to me about living in Germany during World War 2. She shared how frightening it was to see the Germans burning the books and censoring anything that they thought to be controversial or promoting critical thinking. She talked about how they condemned more than just the Jewish people, but also anyone who was not gender -conforming to their ideals, and anyone who was not straight and white. She talked about how they would steal the art too. Then her eyes grew dark as she looked at me and said, "I fear that we are living through this all over again, and we need to remember the evils of our past."

I was shocked. I did not know what to say, other than agree. But this made me realize how wrong it was for me to see only the bad in something like a book so many years before. Instead, I needed to remember

to seek beauty in all things. That diverse ideas are beneficial to society as a whole. But I also needed to find a way to speak out against the injustices in the world today. For if the people today who are banning books, or covering up art, or a number of other things, had actually read the Bible, then they would lump the Bible in with those banned books. We would have to blur out the prophet for 3 years if it was a TV show (Isaiah 20). We discover a similar story to the Giver in Genesis 22. David was rather creepy at times (2 Kings 11). There once was no shame in our bodies (Genesis 2:24-25). Whatever you do, don't read Song of Solomon, especially chapter 4. Don't do it. Maybe the many things people are getting hung up on lately really are not necessarily Christian values. Instead, we should remember that Christ teaches us to do no harm, and let others be who they are, even if we do not agree (Luke 9:54-55) but instead remember to listen to others, hear their concerns and provide for their needs (Matthew 25:40). Jesus was extremely aware of and actively attentive to the important facts and issues of his time and heavily focused on issues of social justice, so don't try to push personal agendas, but instead, seek to understand the interests of others (Philippians 2:3-5). Remember also, that as Christians we are called to demonstrate compassion and kindness, not exude hate and discontent. Instead, we should be more concerned with how we are treating others. (Galatians 5:22–23, John 13:34).
