Several people asked for the recipe for Tuscan Beans & Mushrooms. The company at your table on October 15th might have improved is flavor.

Tuscan Cannellini Beans and Mushrooms INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons oil
- 3 cloves garlic minced
- 1 small onion or 1/2 of a medium finely diced
- 1 teaspoon salt and pepper
- 1 12-ounce pkg mushrooms stems removed & sliced
- 1 teaspoon fresh thyme
- 1 teaspoon fresh oregano
- 2 14-ounce cans fire roasted tomatoes with juice
- 6 14-ounce cannellini beans undrained
 - 2/3 cup sun dried tomatoes roughly chopped in oil

Instructions

- In a large skillet heat oil over medium-high heat until starting to shimmer add the mushrooms, stir until sautéed and slightly brown--about 5 minutes or so. Add the salt and pepper and stir well. Transfer to the plate.
- In the skillet, add the onion and cook until softened and translucent--about 5 minutes. Add the garlic and cook one minute.
- Add all the ingredients into a slow cooker and stir. Place slow cooker on high & cook for 4 hours.

Finding the Holy in Holidays

I have always been fascinated by the historical origins of some of the festivals and holidays we celebrate today. When Christianity spread to the land of the Celts and what would become the British Isles they encountered a people with a rich spiritual belief system. One of the festivals that was popular at the time was called Samhain. Samhain took place on November 1st, and it was a day to honor the dead. But it was believed to be a day when the veil between the world of the dead and the living was the thinnest. They would wear masks to hide them from evil spirits but also it was a harvest festival that had people going door to door getting part of the harvest to share with the community. Usually, there would be a big bonfire celebration and many would carve out a gourd to put burning embers from the fire into the gourd in order to light their way home, but also to bring the embers home to start a fire in their fireplace. Thus was the jack-o-lantern born.

Early Christians saw that the festival was good, but also they struggled with a few things about it. So, what did they do? They did not attack what they did not like. They adopted what they liked about it and began to make it their own. Instead of trying to cancel out a people's ideas or beliefs that were different, they blended two ideas making it easier for others to understand their Christian beliefs. From this, All Saints Day was moved to November 1st. You see, in the 7th century CE Pope Boniface the IV established All Saints' Day on May 13, and over a hundred years later Pope Gregory III moved it to November 1st. The night before became known as All Hallow's Eve, and eventually blended into what we now call Halloween. In case you were wondering, some thought we should celebrate all instead of just the saints and so All Souls Day was established on November 2nd.

Interestingly, much of Central America and South America have a similar holiday on the same days called el Día de los Muertos, or the Day of the Dead. It is also a day of honoring the dead and remembering loved ones who have died.

Other holidays have also seen similar origin stories associated with other faith traditions. Easter originally followed the Jewish calendar observing the 14th day of Nisan in the Jewish calendar to observe the day of the crucifixion on the same day as the Jewish Passover. The Council of Nicea in 325 CE decreed they should celebrate the resurrection on the first Sunday following the first full moon of the Spring Equinox instead. But the name for Easter might just come from a time when once again, Christians encountered those of another faith and chose to adopt customs to help others to better understand the teachings of Christ and the love of God. In Norse, Anglo-Saxon, and Germanic mythology, Eostre was considered a goddess of the spring and new life who once had a fight with Odin. Odin sent his eagle to capture Eostre's bird who laid colored, spotted eggs in the springtime. To hide her bird, and protect it, she transformed it into a rabbit. Children would search the country-side for these colored eggs thought to be left by this rabbit.

Even Christmas has origins blending with the Roman holiday Saturnalia which was a winter festival which took place on the Winter Solstice and usually celebrated between December 17th and 24th.

Holidays - continued

Yule was a similar festival observed by Germanic people. The first recorded Christmas celebration took place in Rome in the year 336 CE, but it would not be until 567 CE that the Council of Tours made Christmastide official as the "12 Days of Christmas" to take place before the celebration of Epiphany.

I have always been fascinated by the stories of early Christians who chose not to attack other traditions, but instead looked for the similarities that could be used to help others discover a message of God's love. Maybe we too can look for the good in those with different opinions, ideas, and beliefs. Shalom,
