The Season of Many Colors

Fall is the season of colors! Many in the Southern states rarely see more than one season and would love to experience more variety in their environment. We are so blessed to have so many different smells and color shades surrounding us in the Fall. When I lived in Smith Center, Kansas, I participated in the annual Gardner Wellness Center Walk on Old Settler's Day in September. I miss some of those fundraising walks through the eastern fields of corn and soybeans, the characteristic smells and sights of the morning dew on both sides of the road.

Have you ever thought of your religious faith as having the quality of many colors? In the Bible, the "coat-of-many-colors" (Kethoneth-passim) is an ornate, long-sleeved, robe of diverse colors usually worn by royalty. Consider that Tamar (2 Sam. 13:18), like Joseph (Gen. 37:3) before her, wore such a robe (it was a long tradition dating back to ancient times for the King's daughters to wear such a robe of royalty). Joseph's brothers took exception to the robe Jacob had given Joseph because they believed it conveyed 'dominion' upon him, while Jacob simply believed that the robe conveyed something quite different, that it conveyed 'the faith of his old age,' his seasoned faith, upon him. Genesis speaks of God having created all humans in the image of God, in other words, as a type of royalty over the planet.

Today, the perennial plant known as Joseph's Coat, has foliage with warm shades of reds, pinks, yellows, coppers, shades of purples and greens. Might we think of our own 'seasoned' faith as reflecting a breadth of different colors? Perhaps, each color might reflect a different seasoning or fragrance of our faith. Black might symbolize concealment or emptiness; Grey, a lack of commitment; Brown, a feeling of being stuck in the mid; Red, representing appetite and craving; Orange, cheerful optimism; Dark Blue, the color of the sky, indicating the beginning of resolution; Green, the renewal of life; Violet speaking of the circle of life, forever repeating itself with new frequencies; Gold reflecting wisdom and Silver echoing a spirit of compassion. Our faith has a rainbow of colors attached to it from the experience of life. So, this Fall 2024, take in all the Fall colors that surround you, and consider how you have grown through these colors with increasing strength and love. These colors form a healing narrative for us like the poetry of the soul. They paint our picture with the colors of divine love.

A sign-up list will be placed in the foyers outside Schwind Hall and the Sanctuary for those who would like to donate a loaf. Your talents are greatly appreciated.



60th Anniversary Sunday in review......

"We came all the way from Durant for this weekend. Wouldn't have missed it for the world! What a great worship and now this luncheon – amazing."

"I took my confirmation (baptism) classes right in this room. Jerry Johnson was my pastor."

"We were the first couple to be married in Schwind Hall."

These are just a few of the comments heard throughout the day on September 8, 2024, when Western Oaks Christian Church celebrated its Sixtieth Anniversary.

By the time Meet and Greet began at 10 that morning, the narthex and gathering area were already overflowing with members & former members, guests, and visitors alike enjoying gracious hospitality provided by Charlene Majetic, Fern and Bob Melton. For some, it was their first time back in decades; for others, it was an opportunity to renew friendships from years gone by.



At 11, worship began with greetings from the Chair of the Congregation, Bob Melton and our Associate Regional Minister, the Rev. Michael Davidson. Bob also invited former members of the staff present to offer their greetings. Among those speaking were Summer Powers, Jan Hulsey, and Francis Oney – the very first music director at the church!

For this special worship, elements of both our contemporary worship and our traditional worship were offered together – a truly blended worship featuring the praise band and the chancel choir, along with the bells of praise and a flute duet. In fact, our current music director, Andrew Orr, sat in on percussion for the praise band music, while praise band leader, Ben Frantz, reciprocated when the choir sang an anthem.







When it came time for the Proclamation, six current members of the church came to the Pulpit. Our charter member, **Suzanne Parker**, began by sharing that twenty-two families joined on that first Sunday, February 9, 1964. She talked about 'the little house on the prairie' church. **Kay Lehman** told of her involvement in nearly every aspect of the church's music program over the decades. Additionally, Kay said she hopes the church will continue to build on the many things we do in the community, working with our community neighbors.

Jack Graham gave us a demonstration of how the pulpit floor could be raised or lowered to accommodate the Rev. Jerry Johnson, who used a wheelchair. "After Jerry Johnson left, we were interviewing an interim minister and I told him, 'You have to be careful with that elevator because it is tied into a time clock and at 12 o'clock it goes clear to the basement!' "Jack also reminded us all how the church comes together when personal tragedy strikes saying, "this family, this church, came to me and put their hand on my shoulder, saying 'Jack Graham, we love you'." Sandra Cook shared how her family had been extended when they joined the church. She taught Sunday School in the Primary Department for thirty-three years! The architect of the current sanctuary, **Dave Brown**, beautifully described how what we have worshiped for the past 41 years came to be and did so within his allotted time! He was given the task of "creating a shelter for worship that was open and inviting to the outside world and, at the same time, the glass walls remind us that we live in this same outside world." Virginia Johnson affirmed Dave's design when she said," the ability to view the sky during worship is a plus for me, an artist." Ginny talked about how this church has welcomed her with open arms. All six speakers certainly gave witness to how the membership of this congregation is like "oaks of righteousness" (Isaiah 61:3c). With great thankfulness and heart-felt emotion it was clear that these men and women are deeply rooted in their faith. (Colossians 2:7)

A near-capacity congregation of 207 then came forward to the Lord's Table to receive Communion.....a Disciples tradition from the very beginning of the church. (Worship and the Anniversary Video can be viewed on YouTube: Western Oaks Christian Church, OKC, OK)

Following worship, a delicious luncheon catered by Running Wild was held in Schwind Hall and church school classrooms. The menu included herb roasted pork loin or orange glazed chicken along with twice baked potato casserole and grilled mixed vegetables. Complimenting this was an array of salads prepared by the Salad Ladies! Assorted rolls and anniversary cake also accompanied the luncheon. Here the visiting continued as a video highlighting the congregations sixty years was presented in Schwind Hall.

Speaking of Running Wild, that could well describe the work of the 60th Anniversary Planning Committee. Not so much the wild part, but the running part, for sure. Appointed in May, under the superb direction of Lynda Gervais, the Committee spent the entire summer planning for the event. Countless hours were given to preparing the worship, the video, conducting interviews, inviting former members and guests, selecting the menu, putting together the Anniversary Booklet, and making sure every element of meet and greet, the worship, and the luncheon worked together to present









The week before September 8, most of the Planning Committee members spent every day at the church getting ready, including preparing for the luncheon, which was served on glass plates, with quests dining at fashionably decorated tableclothed tables with silverware and napkins in place. Many remarked that they appreciated the up-scale atmosphere of the luncheon. A special historical trivia, "Sixty-ish Diamonds in the Rough!", prepared by Jim Ellis and Kay Jewell, completed the program booklet and challenged all!
