Keep the Light Burning

Happy May, everyone! As I was pondering a word for you this month, the Lord kept giving me the image of a lighthouse. May is the month for taking pictures under the rose arbor, or beside the Snowball bush, celebrating Mother's Day, Graduations, and Memorial Day. Sometimes, we have imprompture reunions of friends or family in the cemetery on what some used to call Decoration Day. May is also Mental Health Awareness Month as we seek to remind ourselves to be kind to others and spend some time in taking care of ourselves as well.

And so, lighthouse has become my image for May 2025. My wife, Susan, and I have framed large photographs and paintings of lighthouses from various places around our country and hung them in our bedroom. We love looking at the different kinds and shapes that have evolved over time. Sadly, they are disappearing from our common landscapes.

Lighthouses have been around since ancient times and before the birth of Jesus. Early mariners were guided by fires built on hilltops. Lighthouses were developed to 'raise the fire' so that it could be seen from a greater distance; their purpose was to provide an entrance marker to ports and a warning signal for dangerous reefs and irregular coastlines. Perhaps the most famous of lighthouses was that of the Pharos of Alexandria, Egypt, built between 280 and 247 BCE and was around 450 feet tall, easily regarded as one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. It was built with solid blocks of 'luminescent' limestone and became a model for all later lighthouses, with our English word "headlight" being derived from the Greek word "phara" meaning lighthouse. The designer of the Pharos lighthouse, Sostratus, inscribed the words "Savior God(s)" on metal inside the lighthouse as a dedication. I am reminded of how well the U.S. Coast Guard 'lighthouse keepers' kept up each lighthouse and the grounds around each lighthouse, always well-painted with white, the signal light sharp and clear. In a way, this was a religious and functional practice based on Luke 12:35: "Be ready for service and have your lamps lit." It is our Savior's call to us as well—Jesus is the Light of the World. Don't keep your light under a bushel basket. Share it with the world. Our hymns remind us:

"Keep your lamps trimmed and burning, The time is drawing nigh. Children, don't get weary, 'Til your work is done." (African-American Hymn)

"There's a lighthouse on the hillside that overlooks life's sea. When I'm tossed it sends out a light that I might see. And the light that shines in darkness now will safely lead me home, If it wasn't for the lighthouse, my ship would sail no more."








This picture was drawn by Genova Wage as an expression of her love for all the women of WOCC who serve as moms.
